

List of countries that do not require a visa (visiting Mexico for unpaid activities and for a stay of less than 180 days)

Citizens from the following countries who wish to visit Mexico as tourists, in transit, for business, technical activities, as journalist or for studies, for a period not exceeding 180 days, and who will not receive any remuneration at all in Mexican territory, do not require a visa:

In addition, as an incentive for tourism, the Mexican government simplified certain immigration requirements. Therefore holders of a United States valid visa or a valid Permanent Resident Card issued by US (green card), Canada, United Kingdom, Japan or any of the countries comprising the Schengen Area may travel to Mexico without a Mexican visa for up to six months, if the foreigner is not going to work in Mexico. In such case, the foreigner must present at the port of entry a valid passport, the US visa or Permanent Resident Card and complete an immigration form (FMM).

Important Note:

Immigration authorities may decide to refuse the request to enter the country if the applicant is subject to criminal process or has been convicted of a serious crime as defined by national laws on criminal matters

or provisions in international treaties or conventions that the Mexican State is party to, or if according to the immigration authority the foreigner fail to comply with the requirements in accordance with Article 43 of the Migration Law.
